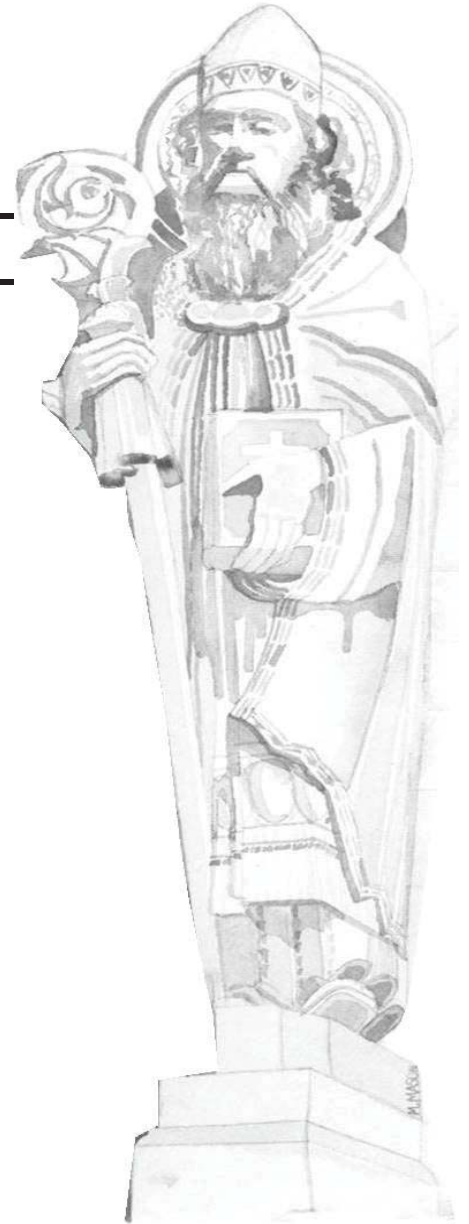

THE EIGHTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

In today's Gospel, Jesus seems to be telling the apostles to have a completely different and larger perspective than the Gentiles or non-believers. When Jesus says "I'm telling you not to worry about your life or your body, what to eat or what to wear..." this is not just a command to live a carefree life, with a don't worry, be happy" attitude. Jesus knows the basics of how to provide food, shelter and clothing for ourselves and our families are always going to be on the apostles minds and on ours. There is nothing evil in that we are not angels without bodies. But Jesus gives us options. The time and energy we invest in working and spending our daily needs can be seen either as a way of serving God or a way of pursuing wealth. In doing our tasks, we can trust God, or we can fret over the bank balance; we can seek God's rule over our lives, or we can worry endlessly about tomorrow. Jesus reminds us that we can place our total trust in God.

Because we believe we can control and create our own world, we attempt to judge multiple agendas and we pay a price of neglecting those closest to us. Too late we reach the point of asking "was it worth it?" We really can't serve two masters.

ASH WEDNESDAY

Wednesday, March 5th is Ash Wednesday, the beginning of the Lenten Season. Ashes will be blessed and distributed after the homily of the Mass. Mass will be celebrated at 8:30 am, Noon and 7pm. A service with distribution of ashes will be celebrated at 4pm also.

LENTEN REGULATIONS

1. Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fast and abstinence. The Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence in the United States.
2. The obligation of abstinence (refraining from eating meat) begins at the age of 14. The law of fasting (limiting oneself to one full meal and two lighter meals) obliges all between the ages of 18-59. No one should consider this obligation lightly.
3. Those individuals who have a medical condition in which fasting may be harmful are not obligated to fast, but should perform some other act of penance suitable to their age.
4. Pastors and parents are to see to it that minors, though not bound by the law of fast and abstinence, are educated in the authentic sense of penance and encouraged to do acts of penance suitable to their age.
5. All members of the Christian Faithful are encouraged to do acts of penance and charity during the Lenten season beyond what is prescribed by law.
6. As a general rule, a request for a dispensation from the obligation of abstinence on Fridays of Lent will not be considered unless some serious reason is present. The attendance of social events (wedding, wakes etc.) are not considered sufficient reason to request a dispensation.

STATIONS OF THE CROSS

The 14 Stations of the Cross can be found in almost every Catholic church and chapel, probably because throughout our history, Christians have longed to literally walk in the footsteps of Christ. For nearly 2000 years the shrines in and around Jerusalem have drawn pilgrims inspired by the life and death of the Lord. However, not everyone is able to travel to the Holy Land, so ever since the Middle Ages, churches began erecting images devoted to the various aspects of the passion. By the 15th century, the Franciscans had developed a devotion they called "station," which means a place where people stand still or gather together. It took a while to fix the number and the names of the stations, but in 1731 Pope Clement XII established the 14 we know today. Even now there are variations on the number. Some versions (like the one we use here) add a 15th station, the Resurrection of Christ, because the death of Christ means nothing without the resurrection. Another example is the version designed by Pope John Paul II which eliminates some which were based on tradition (the 3 falls, Veronica, etc) and replaces them with events from the gospels. Stations will be celebrated every Friday at 7pm during Lent.
