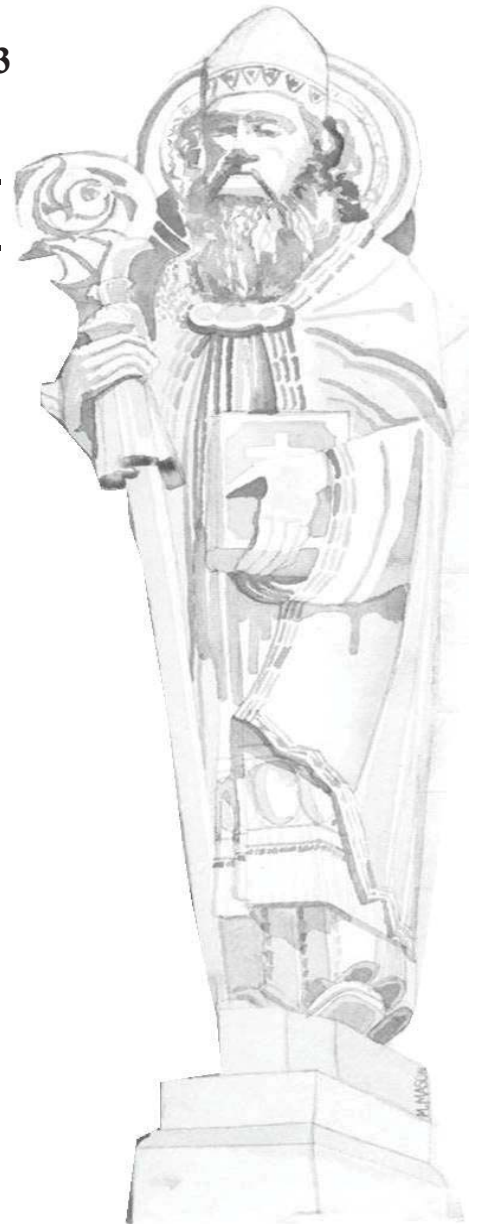

TWENTY-SEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

NATURAL FAMILY PLANNING, PROMOTION DAY,

OCTOBER 11TH: Natural Family Planning (NFP) methods represent authentic family planning. They can be used to both achieve and to postpone a pregnancy. NFP makes use of periodic abstinence based upon the observation of the women's natural signs of fertility, in order to space births or to limit the number of children when there is a serious reason to do so, this practice fosters in couples an attitude of respect and wonder in the face of human life, which is sacred.
